

Hi, everybody. We had an incident involving an electrical fire on a bus this morning. All students and the driver are safe.

The bus carries students to Valley Christian Academy in Aurora. The bus picked up about 5-6 students at Rushwood, then made its way to its second stop at Lee Eaton. As the bus approached Lee Eaton, the driver noticed a strange smell and saw some smoke. Thinking the bus was experiencing problems with the radiator, the driver radioed for a back up bus to meet him at Lee Eaton so he could continue his route.

He pulled into the Lee Eaton parking lot and evacuated the bus. All students were safe.

The smoke then became more intense and the driver noticed some smoldering. He called the Northfield Village fire department, who came and extinguished the fire. The bus will be towed back to the bus garage and examined.

Students boarded the new bus and were taken to school. Per protocol, a new driver was assigned to finish the route.

Important subjects to kick off the school year

Welcome to September! The Nordonia Schools have gotten off to a great start to the 2013-14 school year. This month I would like to touch on a few items.

State Report Card: As you read about in the News Leader a few weeks ago, we received our report card from the Ohio Department of Education, and we are very excited at the results. As you know, the state has done away with the old rating system you were used to (Excellent, Continuous Improvement, etc.) and replaced it with a system that gives letter grades (A, B, C, D, F).

If the state did not change systems, the Nordonia Schools would have been rated Excellent with Distinction again. Even with the new ratings, the Nordonia Schools had the second highest grade average in Summit County. Most impressive is that we earned the highest Performance Index in district history, and overall our students exceeded Value Added, meaning they learned more than a year's worth of material in a single year.

Nordonia students get a top-notch education. We are proud of the work we do, but we are not content to rest on our laurels. We will continue striving to improve instruction so we can best prepare our students for college and careers.

ALICE Training: As part of our continued focus on safety training for our staff, we have scheduled ALICE training for our entire certified staff and a majority of our classified staff in Oc-

recognized that traditional lockdown procedures were not helping people survive, ALICE builds on shelter-inplace procedures by adding alternative actions that will increase survivability during such attacks.

With feedback from our local safety forces and our District Safety Committee, we have decided that the ALICE program will be used to enhance, not replace, our current safety practices. It is our plan over the next several months much of our student body (initially high school and middle school) trained on this new procedure.

We hope that we will never need to use any of these strategies. Students safety is our highest priority, however, so we will continue to be proactive in creating a safe, nurturing school environment.

Parent Mentor Program: A parent mentor is the parent of a child with a disability employed to help school districts and families by providing training, support, and information services. Kitty Boylan is the parent mentor for the Nordonia Schools.

Ohio parent mentor projects are funded through grants from the Ohio Department of Education. The mission of the Ohio parent mentors is to provide the necessary support and resources to families of children with disabilities and the professionals who serve them.

Some of the services provided by the parent mentor include guiding parents through the special education process including understanding their rights and responsibilities, listening and providing support to families and staff, providing information and resources, attending IEP and other meetings when requested, and conducting information sessions and workshops.

I had to believe that I was going to get through this and that I was going to be a stronger person in the end. I had to look at all the positive that would come out of having cancer. Cancer has empowered me to change my life

forever for the better. It inspired me to change many aspects of my life. I have more faith, strength, and courage than ever before. I changed my eating habits, lost 50 pounds and I am in the best shape that I have ever been in my life. I ran my first 5k this past May and I would have never imagined doing that before I had breast cancer. I am truly blessed to be an inspiration to so many of my friends and family. One of my favorite quotes that keeps me motivated is, "I'm braver because I fought a giant and won. I'm stronger because I had to be. I'm happier because I learned what matters. I stand taller because I am a survivor!"



Shifts in More Detail

Shifts in Math

- <u>Focus:</u> Significantly narrow and deepen the scope. Less is more. Students reach strong conceptual understanding and are able to transfer mathematical skills and understanding across concepts and grades.
- <u>Coherency:</u> Connect the learning within and across grades –VERTICAL ALIGNMENT-<u>extension of previous learning</u>
- **Fluency:** Students have speed and accuracy with simple calculationsmemorize core functions
- **Deep Understanding:** Students should see math as more than a set of mnemonics or discrete procedures (memorize but have no idea why they are doing it) **More than one way to get to the answer** Find different ways for students to get the answer
- **Application:** Choose the appropriate concept for application-real world situations. Teachers in content areas outside of math, particularly science, ensure that student are using math at all grade levels- to make meaning of and access content.
- **Dual Intensity:** Students practicing and understanding-more balance we are intense about students being fluent and application.

Priorities for Focus in Math

<u>Shifts in ELA</u>

- <u>Informational Text Balance</u>: Students today are asked to read little expository text. The demands of college and career ready: 80% Informational texts!
- <u>Building Knowledge in Content Areas</u>: The standards read that more rigorous and informational text needs to be read not only in ELA classes but in the rest of the classes.
- <u>Staircase of Complexity:</u> There has been a steady decline since 1962 in reading level expectations.
- <u>Text Based Answers:</u> Rich and rigorous discussions/lessons/answers based on a common text. Be sure to align questions to the text, not asking for students opinions.
- <u>Writing from Sources</u>: Students provide evidence to inform or argue rather than the personal narrative or creative writing.
- <u>Academic Vocabulary</u>: By focusing on the comprehension of pivotal and commonly found words, teachers constantly build students' ability to access more complex texts across the content areas (Tier II words).
- <u>Tier 1</u> "the words of everyday speech usually learned in the early grades"
- Tier 2 "far more likely to appear in written texts than in speech" and "appear in all sorts of texts"
- <u>**Tier 3**</u> "specific to a domain or field of study (*lava, carburetor, legislature, circumference, aorta*)" –" often explicitly defined by the author of a text, repeatedly used, and otherwise heavily scaffolded (e.g., made a part of a glossary)"

PARCC-ELA Resource

One of the major shifts of the CCSS is an emphasis on developing skills for comprehending and analyzing informational texts. Increased exposure to informational texts better prepares students for the various types of texts they will encounter in college and the workplace. The array of passages selected for assessment from K-12 should support the development of the necessary skills to handle this range of informational texts.

Another shift is an increased emphasis on the analysis across multiple texts, often of varied genres and media. Several standards, especially for reading literature, require intertextual and multi-media analysis. These expectations require special attention to selection of related passages, chosen specifically to support assessment of the full range of expectations.

This document offers guidelines for selecting passages regarding five considerations. These guidelines should inform the training of passage finders in order to ensure a pool of acceptable passages that can support assessment of the CCSS for the PARCC summative assessments. These guidelines will also inform form assemblers as they construct forms that will assess the full continuum of standards. In choosing passages, passage finders should consider:

- A. Using the framework for determining Text Complexity
- B. Selecting a variety of text types (including different types of texts, a balance of authors by gender and ethnicity, and texts that appeal to a diverse student population)
- C. Selecting passages that allow for a range of standards/evidences to be demonstrated to meet the PARCC claims
- D. Pairing Passages Effectively
- E. Meeting Demands of Bias and Sensitivity Guidelines
