- ▶ How did this thing pass or fail?
- What were they thinking?!

State Legislatures Vary


- ▶ 41(ND) 424 (NH) in size
- Professional, full-time to part-time citizen
- Length of sessions (two months to yearround)
- ▶ 268 measures introduced to 6,600

Forget What You Learned in Civics

A bill is introduced because:

- Legislators learn something model legislation from organization, news story, conferences
- Receive a constituent complaint
- They get an idea



Influencing Factors

- Voters
- Existing laws and court decisions
- Power of the Governor (especially first year)
- Political party and candidate positioning

Influencing Factors (continued)

- Media
- ▶ Think tanks/ALEC
- Campaign contributions/gifts
- Lobbyists/organizations
- Personal relationships/feuds
- Scandal
- Proactive government officials
- Time and deadlines
- Reliance on staff
- > Term limits

Idea Meets Reality

- Does it have leadership support?
- Does it have bipartisan appeal?
- Who will passage of the bill help?
- Who will passage hurt?
- ▶ How will it play back home?
- How is the media portraying it?

Example: Class Size

- Target fiscal resources to neediest
- Set based on research
- Allow class size to be set as needed locally
- Ability to differentiate instruction
- Shifts money
- Election year
 - Teachers
 - Parents
- Perception

Game Plan

- Do they really want to pass it or just make a statement?
- Which legislators should you focus on to help it, stop it, or change it?
- Do leaders of the other chamber support it?
- Will it affect different parts of the state differently?
- What other groups support it or oppose it?

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Rules of Engagement

- Constitution
- Rules of each chamber
- Parliamentary procedure
- Governor

Constitution

- Origin of budget and revenue bills
- Ad valorem exemptions require a 2/3 vote
- Constitutional amendments require a 2/3 vote

Power of Committee Structure


- Committee assignment

- House subcommittees

 - Hold
 - Table
 - Reconsider
 - Recommit
- Holding bills hostage
- Rules Committee

Legislative Rules

- Crossover day

 - conference committee reports
 - $\,{}^{_{\odot}}$ Senate rule on length of amendment

- Calendar
- Governor
 - Veto
 - Order of signing

- Think of legislation in the context of the whole
 - Personalities
 - Alliances
 - Motivations
 - Public opinion

- Paid advocates to lobby and/or monitor
- Public websites
- Contacts including: friendly legislators/legislative staffers/bureaucrats/allied organizations
- Membership activation (real grassroots vs. "astroturf" or advertising)
- No guarantees, but these actions can help you keep better informed and possibly mitigate the worst the system can produce.
