Flawed data found in national report on Ohio school-funding equity

The Ohio Education Policy Institute (OEPI) found a major flaw in a report by The Education Trust that claimed Ohio ranks second nationally in providing equitable funding for students from low-income families. The OEPI analysis, commissioned by OSBA, the Ohio Association of School Business Officials and the Buckeye Association of School Administrators, found Ohio actually ranks 32nd among the 50 states in funding for school districts with large numbers of students in poverty. OEPI said the report is flawed because its revenue data includes all state and local revenue schools receive. However, the enrollment data used to compute per-pupil spending excludes charter school students, the revenue for which is included in the district totals. ODE consolidation, school funding focus of legislative conference

Public education officials remain vocal about plans to consolidate the Ohio Department of Education (ODE). House Bill (HB) 512 would weaken the State Board of Education's authority by shifting nearly all of its duties to a new state agency called the Department of Learning and Achievement.

The legislation, sponsored by Rep. **Bill Reineke** (R-Tiffin), drew plenty of questions and criticisms at the March 6 State Legislative Conference in Columbus, where more than 100 school board members, administrators and others had the opportunity to meet face to face with legislators and their aides.

The annual event — hosted by OSBA, the Buckeye Association of School Administrators (BASA) and the Ohio Association of School Business Officials (OASBO) —

provides a forum for gathering with state representatives and senators to discuss key education issues.

- Sen. Peggy Lehner (R-Kettering), chair, Senate Education Committee;
- Rep. **John Patterson** (D-Jefferson). OSBA, BASA and OASBO oppose HB 512, which would merge ODE with the Department of Higher Education and the Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation. The bill would move decisions about important topics such as setting the state's learning standards, graduation requirements and school district report cards to a politically appointed staff, which is much different from the current process that includes many opportunities for public input.

The bill, which is more than 2,400 pages, is receiving hearings in the House Government Accountability and Oversight Committee, where the three associations offered opponent testimony (http://links.ohioschoolboards.org/72811).

Both Brenner and Lehner have reservations about the bill but see the need for change.

"Pretty much every governor has implemented policy changes, but the governors aren't the ones being held accountable for their policy changes," Brenner told attendees. "If you don't want the governor making all of these policy changes, then there's got to be a different way of structuring it."

Lehner suggested the need for an education policy that "surpasses a particular governor, so we don't have a new policy or leadership team every four to eight years. Talk about whiplash in the education world." She mentioned the idea of a K-20 education council made up of educators across the spectrum.

Lehner also discussed school safety and her concerns that in the "rush to do something, we don't make the best choices." She's worried about the "kids who are falling through the cracks. Those kids are in real danger of being pushed over the edge."

Brenner echoed those concerns and said there is a need for more federal and state funding for mental health services.

OSBA, BASA and OASBO support Senate Bill (SB) 216, sponsored by Huffman, which passed in the Senate March 21. Called the Ohio Public School Deregulation Act, the bill moved to the House for further consideration. The legislation, if approved, would reduce the number of mandates and regulations public schools are required to follow.

"This is a cleaning-out-yourbasement bill and really a correction of a lot of things that are there," Huffman told attendees.

SB 216 would reduce dozens of mandates related to education standards, including teacher licensure and aide permits; the Ohio Teacher Evaluation System; state testing; student management and safety; and preschool operating standards.

"The important thing here is local control," Huffman said. "We have a system made up of highly educated people, from superintendents to assistant superintendents and building principals, many of whom have years and years of experience making decisions on a daily basis."

Patterson told attendees the bipartisan Education Funding Caucus is close to releasing a plan to address shortcomings in Ohio's school-funding system. Patterson launched the caucus in the Ohio General Assembly in 2013.

"The gubernatorial candidates will be able to run on it or run away from it," he said of the plan.

The challenge, he said, is finding a formula that will work for

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everyone. Most schools saw flat funding or cuts under the state budget enacted in June 2017.

"I want to apologize for the budget you inherited," Patterson said. "It was the best we could do given the limited resources up front and some of the excessive means on the end. I didn't like it ... I know it's not where it needs to be."

Following the morning sessions, attendees had lunch with

lawmakers and their aides and held further discussions later in the day.

Property valuation bill approved by House, moves to Senate

On March 21, the Ohio House of Representatives passed House Bill (HB) 343, which now heads to the Senate for further consideration. OSBA encourages members to review this legislation and make contact with their local state senators and urge their opposition to this bill.

HB 343, as passed by the House, would require a school board, in addition to other local taxing entities, to provide written notification to a property owner at least seven business days prior to initiating a claim on property valuation. The bill also requires the board to pass a resolution approving the tax claim or counterclaim at a public meeting prior to moving forward with the county board of revision (BOR) process.

Currently, tax claims may be initiated by a board of education or a property owner; they then are heard before the BOR. The BOR is made up of the county treasurer,

county auditor and a member of the board of county commissioners. OSBA believes the majority of school districts engaging in the BOR process by filing claims requesting valuation increases or counterclaims defending the auditor's values currently operate in a fair and ethical manner.

OSBA, the Buckeye Association of School Administrators and the Ohio Association of School Business Officials maintain that Ohio's current property valuation and tax system has worked to benefit its citizens for decades. It affords all interested parties the ability to participate in the process by providing a proper procedure for checks and balances to preserve fair and equal taxation practices. HB 343's unnecessary changes to this long-respected system are highly objectionable.

For the following reasons, OSBA is opposed to the bill's requirements that the district must send notification to the property

owner that it is considering a BOR filing on the value of his or her property, and that the board must pass a resolution naming all the properties where the board intends to challenge values:

- The BOR already is required to notify the property owner when values are challenged.
- The unfunded mandate for notification will add unnecessary costs to school districts and taxpayers.
- The required advance notice to the property owner before the board of education votes to challenge property values will make the decision of the board more political. HB 343 opens the process to becoming politicized by giving property owners the ability to put pressure on the board not to challenge property values prior to board action. This has the potential of removing all objectivity from the current process.
- Ohio law is clear that the sale

Students' prom fashion show raises money for organ donation

Students at **Rocky River City**'s Rocky River High School put on their best prom attire and walked the fashion runway, all in the name of charity.

Over eight years, the seniors' annual prom fashion show has raised more than \$63,000 for local nonprofit organizations.

The participating students are part of **Kristen Kalinowski**'s service learning class.

Traci and Russ Tigue founded BGVT in 2015 when their infant son, Brodie, underwent a liver transplant to save his life. Who was the donor? His mother, who gave a portion of her liver when Brodie was 5 months old.

price of a property is the best determiner of the property's value. Therefore, claims based on sales are reasonable and evident, and no purpose is served by a property owner urging the board of education to not file a claim.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. **Derek Merrin** (R-Monclova Township),
maintains that this legislation is
needed because local school board
members are not aware of when
their districts file tax claims. In
countering Merrin's assumption,
OSBA has made the following
suggestions for addressing the
perceived abuses of the privilege of
participating in the BOR process:

• Boards of education that intend to file claims and counterclaims to

request valuation increases to defend the auditor's values must pass a resolution setting the parameters for the district's participation in the BOR process. The superintendent and/or treasurer must then follow the board's policy when administering the claims and counterclaims the district files with the BOR.

- Contracts with any agent (attorney) working on behalf of a school district or other taxing entity must include only a fee-for-service payment arrangement. There would be no contingency payments based on the results of valuation claims.
- Contracts with any agent must stipulate that no claims or counterclaims may be submitted to

the BOR without prior approval of the school district administration, which would be the treasurer or superintendent, as determined by the district. The administration could be required to give the board of education a list of properties that have been determined to warrant a claim or counterclaim.

While OSBA is disappointed with the action taken by the House, the bill still needs consideration by the Senate to continue through the process. Please contact your state senators and urge them to oppose this harmful legislation.
