School districts announcing significant staff cuts around Ohio, nation

Facing large budget deficits and state funding losses as federal stimulus funds run out, school districts across Ohio and the U.S. are planning drastic staff cuts. According to news reports, **Cleveland Municipal** will cut nearly 800 employees; **Lorain City** over 200; **Columbus City** more than 160; and **Dayton City** nearly 100. The majority of those to be laid off are teachers. U.S. Secretary of Education **Arne Duncan** testified to a Senate panel in April that state budget cuts could imperil from 100,000 to 300,000 education jobs. He also advocated "another round of emergency support for America's schools."

Attendees praise Board Leadership Institute's program, new location

More than 225 school board members attended the April 23-24 OSBA Board Leadership Institute (BLI) in Columbus. The event featured keynote speakers **Harvey Alston**, a motivational expert, and Ohio Superintendent of Public Instruction **Deborah S. Delisle**, as well as 18 breakout sessions and many networking opportunities. Attendees were full of praise for the ninth annual institute and its new location at the Hilton Columbus/Polaris. New law changes deadlines for school tax issue election filings

Amended Substitute House Bill 48 mandates earlier deadlines for placing school district tax issues on the ballot. The law goes into effect on July 2 and will apply to elections from Nov. 2 onward. For more details, see "Legislative Report" on page 6.

State reaches EdChoice voucher cap; senator backs expanded program

For the first time, applications for the Ohio Educational Choice Scholarship have topped the program's legal cap. The state reported receiving 14,696 applications for the 2010-11 school year. The program authorizes Ohio to provide up to 14,000 eligible students with taxpayer-funded scholarships to attend the participating private school of their choice. State Sen. **Gary Cates** (R-West Chester) has said that he would support expanding the program. For more information, visit http://links.osba-ohio.org/62363.

Retired officers say improving school nutrition a national security issue

More than nine million young adults — 27% of all Americans age 17 to 24 — are too overweight to join the military, according to a new report by Mission: Readiness, a nonprofit group of more than 130 retired senior military leaders. Calling rising rates of child obesity a serious threat to national security, the group is advocating for new child nutrition legislation to help reduce the obesity epidemic and expand the pool of healthy young adults available for military service. The report said that improving school nutrition is a crucial area for reducing or preventing child obesity. It cited

research showing that up to 40% of children's daily calorie intake occurs at school and that 80% of children who were overweight between the ages of 10 to 15 were obese by age 25.

Secretary of state urges 2010 grads to register to vote

Ohio Secretary of State Jennifer Brunner has launched Grads Vote 2010, a project that encourages high school seniors of voting age to take part in the electoral process. Summer is the time to gain extra media exposure for your district

Although schools are quiet during the summer months, there is still an opportunity to gain media attention for your district. You can get wonderful coverage for your schools from reporters seeking an education story.

Late spring is the perfect time to start compiling a list of story ideas that you can offer during the slow summer months. List your own story ideas, or save time and use the list in this article. Make sure you have a contact person and phone number for each story. Make note of dates the sources will be available during the summer. If a contact person works year-round but takes time off during the summer, make note of the dates he or she will be gone so that you don't suggest a story idea and then have no one available for an interview. Jot down "selling points," such as photos for newspapers, visuals for television and sound bites that would add to radio coverage. The easier you can make it for reporters to get a story with visuals and sound, the more likely they are to do the story.

If your idea involves students, remember to use your district's guidelines and policies for student interviews and photos.

Below are some ideas to get you started on your summer media

coverage idea sheet.

• Dispel the idea of teachers "having the summer off" by coming up with different story ideas. Topics could include classes teachers are taking during the summer months, tutoring sessions and summer school classes.

• Work with your maintenance, transportation and groundskeeping staff to find out what they are doing this summer to prepare for the new school year.

• Ask a school volunteer to write an editorial describing his or her experiences in the district. Include tips for those wanting to volunteer.

• Use the quiet summer months to provide information on complicated topics such as the No Child Left Behind Act, adequate yearly progress and the district's report card. Give journalists an opportunity to meet with the superintendent and curriculum staff.
Educate reporters about school budgets. Develop a single sheet for the media highlighting budget increases, decreases, new funds, grants and other key details.

• Feature students and staff studying in a foreign country during the summer.

• Write columns encouraging parental involvement. Include various ways parents can become more involved in their students' learning.

• Suggest story ideas that involve the actual work being done by the school board or feature individual school board members.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Bill changes election deadlines

House Bill (HB) 48, sponsored by Rep. Peter Ujvagi (D-Toledo), primarily addresses leave for military spouses and the federal Military Overseas Voter Empowerment Act. It was passed on April 2 and becomes effective on July 2, 2010. However, because it was a piece of legislation moving quickly through the General Assembly, some other unrelated provisions were amended into the bill before it was passed by the legislature and signed by the governor. One of those provisions is significant for school boards because it changes filing deadlines for elections on and after Nov. 2.

For the majority of issues, materials will have to be filed with the board of elections at least 90 days (as opposed to 75 days under current law) before the date of the election except:

- emergency tax levies,
- school district income tax levies,
- certain bond issues.

Emergency tax levies: The only change made by HB 48 was to extend the deadline for filing all proceedings with the board of elections from 75 days (currently) to 90 days. However, the resolution of necessity will need to be adopted and the county auditor's millage certification obtained well before the 90-day deadline to permit the requisite filing to be made on that date. Under current law, the deadline for adoption of the resolution of necessity and its delivery to the county auditor is 80 days before the election. Under both current law and HB 48, the county auditor has five days after receiving the resolution to make the millage certification.

School district income tax levies: The first resolution must be adopted and filed with the state tax commissioner no later than the 100th day prior to the election. The remaining proceedings will be required to be taken and filings

made with the board of elections no later than the 90th day prior to the election. Under current law, those deadlines are 85 days and 75 days, respectively.

Certain bond issues: School districts intending to submit a bond issue that would require the consent of the Ohio superintendent of public instruction and the state tax commissioner because it would cause the district's net indebtedness to exceed 4% of its tax valuation are required to file the following with the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) and the Ohio Department of Taxation (ODT) no later than the 120th day prior to the election: • a letter requesting the 4% consents,

• a statement of net bonded indebtedness on DTE Form 131 (if the board of education has not yet adopted its resolution of necessity for the bond issue as of that date, a draft DTE Form 131 may be submitted),

• a "general certificate" setting forth certain specific information about the school district.

Additional materials necessary to apply for consent to exceed the 4% level must be filed with ODE and ODT no later than the 95th day before the election. The resolution of necessity, county auditor's

Students' rain garden will make for a healthier Chagrin River

A landscaping project by Mayfield Excel Technical Education Career Consortium students will benefit their community and the environment for years to come.

With the support of the cities of Highland Heights and Mayfield Heights, the Euclid Creek Watershed and the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District, students from the consortium's horticulture program created a rain garden that will, in time, improve the quality of the Chagrin River. Located in front of the **Mayfield City** Board of Education building, the rain garden collects and treats storm water draining from the building's 1,100-square-foot roof. The saucer-shaped garden is designed to increase infiltration, allowing rain and snowmelt to seep naturally into the ground. The rain garden's perennial native plants help by absorbing water with roots that can be up to 15 feet deep.

"It's a partnership we are only too happy to support," said Mayfield Superintendent **Phillip Price**. "This really is a true win-win situation for everyone involved: our students, our community and, of course, the Chagrin River."

The Mayfield Excel Technical Education Career Consortium provides students expanded options, including college-prep, tech-prep, school-to-work and other opportunities. It serves nine northeastern Ohio school districts.

millage certifications and resolution to proceed must be filed with the board of elections no later than the 90th day prior to the election. Under current law, those deadlines are 105 days, 80 days and 75 days, respectively.

OSBA encourages districts to participate in Race to the Top

OSBA's Executive Committee recently approved a resolution encouraging school boards to participate in Ohio's Race to the Top Phase 2 grant application. After lengthy discussion and comments by Executive Committee members, the following resolution was approved unanimously: "The Executive Committee of the Ohio School Boards Association urges all member boards of education to engage in conversation with their district superintendents and the leadership of the local teacher associations about participation in the Race to the Top and to sign the memorandum of understanding to be a participating district in the application.

The recommendation is based on the committee members' belief that state and local educational improvement and reform efforts will be greatly enhanced by securing these federal dollars and further, that school districts in general, and boards of education in particular, must demonstrate to their local communities that every effort is being taken to obtain financial resources for their district."

In order to participate in Race to the Top, school districts must submit a memorandum of understanding signed by the board president, superintendent and union president by 4 p.m. on Friday, May 14. For more information visit **www.rttt.education.ohio.gov**.
