Two southwest Ohio schools celebrate ACT perfection

Twenty students at **Sycamore Community City**'s Sycamore High School and 17 students from **Cincinnati Public**'s Walnut Hills High School achieved the highest possible composite score on the ACT, a 36.

The ACT is a standardized assessment used for college admission and consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science. A student's composite score is the average of the four tests. The class of 2017's average composite score was 21, ACT reported.

Nationwide, approximately one-tenth of 1% of students who take the test earn a perfect score, according to ACT. At Sycamore High School, 33 seniors missed a perfect score by a single point. Twenty-three Walnut Hills High School students did the same.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

House passes bill eliminating academic distress commissions

House Bill (HB) 154, sponsored by Rep. **Don Jones** (R-Freeport) and Rep. **Joe Miller** (D-Amherst), was passed by the Ohio House of Representatives on May 1 by a vote of 83-12. The bill seeks to repeal provisions put in place by 2015's HB 70, which assigns academic distress commissions (ADCs) to persistently low-performing school districts.

Districts that receive an overall F letter grade on the state report card for three consecutive years are taken over by the state via an ADC. Currently, ADCs are overseeing Youngstown City, Lorain City and East Cleveland City.

HB 154, as passed by the House, dissolves all current ADCs and repeals the law on establishing any new commissions. It would require, beginning in July 2019, districts currently under the control of an ADC to create an improvement team for each school building that received an overall letter grade of F for the previous year. The superintendent of public instruction also must designate these buildings as "in need of improvement."

Under current law, students in a district under the control of an ADC are eligible for an EdChoice Scholarship Program voucher. HB

154 clarifies that a student who chose to use a voucher may continue to do so once the ADC is dissolved. However, the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) is prohibited from awarding vouchers to first-time students after the law becomes effective.

According to the bill, beginning in July 2020, any school building that receives an overall grade of F for the previous school year must establish an improvement team. The team is assembled by the local school board and must take the following measures:

• conduct a performance audit of the school building by reviewing Continued on page 6

the needs of the students, parents, teachers and administrators;

- develop a school improvement plan based on a multitiered, evidence-based model;
- submit the improvement plan to the district school board for approval.

School buildings that receive an F for a second consecutive year must begin implementing the improvement plan that is

developed by the team. If a building receives an F for a third consecutive year, ODE may conduct a mid-year or end-of-year review of the plan and offer feedback to the team, local board and district superintendent. If the school building receives an F for a fourth consecutive year, the state superintendent of public instruction is required to review the progress made under the

improvement plan and decide if the school building should be moved out of "in need of improvement" status as determined by rules adopted by the State Board of Education.

HB 154 now proceeds to the Ohio Senate for further action.

Webinar:

I'm drowning in records (but afraid to throw any away): A records retention primer

Have you ever looked in despair at your towering inbox, bulging file cabinets and old data storage systems? School districts create an enormous amount of paper and electronic records but sometimes struggle with managing them. Student's cosmetics collection drive aims to save wildlife

An eighth-grader at **Ottawa Hills Local (Lucas)** with a passion for the environment hopes her cosmetics collection drive helps save endangered wildlife.

Libby Hagenbuch intended to collect as many used mascara wands in the Toledo area as possible by the end of April, clean them and ship them to the Appalachian Wildlife Refuge, a nonprofit that addresses the needs of endangered and orphaned wildlife in western North Carolina.

The wands are used to remove parasites from the animals' fur, she told a local newspaper.

Libby was inspired by an Instagram post about Wands for Wildlife.

"It was a post that said, 'Ladies, collect mascara wands and send it to this address' — they call it 'wandraiser,' so I figured it'd be a cool fundraiser to bring to Ottawa Hills," she said.

Libby organized a collection drive at her school and partnered

with local businesses. Her goal was to collect at least 250 used wands.

Courtnay Cousino, who owns a local coffee shop, was excited to team up with Libby.

"I have a lot of mascara tubes and thought, 'Oh my gosh, I'd love to be involved,'" Cousino said. "I think a lot of women like myself say, 'Aw man, we're just tossing this out,' and now there's something to do."
