School levy passage rates on primary ballot drop sharply from 2019

Ohio voters approved 64% of the school tax issues in the April 28 primary election. The passage of 63 of 99 issues marked a double-digit decrease from the 2019 primary election when voters approved 81 of 104 school tax issues, a passage rate of 78%. Thirty-eight percent of new money requests were approved, with 20 of 53 issues passing, another double-digit decrease from 2019. In last year's primary, voters approved 31 of 52 new tax issues for a 60% passage rate. Renewal issues fared much better, with 93% of them passing. That was a slight decrease from the 2019 primary renewal passage rate of 96%. The primary election date was postponed from March 17 to April 28 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. 

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

K-12 education bears brunt of COVID-19 budget cuts

During the spring months of even-numbered years, most legislative work at the Ohio Statehouse is devoted to what insiders refer to as the capital budget, a large, debt-financed spending package focused mainly on the purchase, construction or renovation of facilities. It's in this legislation that the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission sees its budget replenished to aid school districts and others with building projects, among other purposes. It's also an opportunity for lawmakers to direct state dollars back to their home districts. This spring, however, the focus of Gov. **Mike DeWine** and the Ohio General Assembly is not on the capital budget but squarely upon addressing the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects on Ohio.

Facing a bleak state budget outlook and deficits of several hundred million dollars, DeWine on May 5 announced what would amount to a \$782 million reduction in state spending for the remaining weeks of fiscal year (FY) 2020. K-12 education accounts for 42% of state-source spending — the largest of all portions. So, it was no surprise to see it atop all areas slashed with a \$300 million reduction in state foundation formula funding, representing a

3.7% cut in state education aid on an annual basis.

The governor also reduced education spending by an additional \$55 million in other areas, including auxiliary services and administrative cost reimbursements for chartered nonpublic schools; savings from not administering state tests in the 2019-20 school year; and fewer applications for income-based vouchers in the Educational Choice Scholarship Program.

Cuts were not applied uniformly among Ohio's school districts. Instead, reductions were applied in an equalized manner, meaning school districts with less capacity to raise revenue locally received a smaller per-pupil reduction than school districts with a higher capacity to raise revenue locally. In other words, poorer school districts received a smaller per-pupil cut than that of their wealthier counterparts. This methodology is similar to the equitable manner in which state aid is distributed to each school district. Cuts range from \$89 to \$304 on a per-pupil basis.

Broken down by quintiles — or five groups ranging from lowest wealth to highest wealth, with 122 school districts in each group — the highest wealth quintile saw the

largest reduction, with \$76 million, and the lowest wealth quintile saw the smallest reduction, with \$52 million. On a per-pupil basis grouped by quintiles, high-wealth districts saw an average reduction of \$254 per pupil, and low-wealth districts saw an average reduction of \$118 per pupil. Broken down by typology — a state classification of demographic and geographic characteristics — wealthier suburban districts and large urban districts experienced the widest range in per-pupil reduction amounts. The high-income suburban districts saw an average per pupil reduction of \$226 per student, while the very high-poverty large urban districts saw an average reduction of \$128 per pupil.

Meanwhile, funding for community schools and STEM schools also was reduced, albeit by smaller amounts. Their reduction amounted to \$89 per pupil, equal to the lowest per-pupil reduction amount applied to school districts. The cut represents a 1% reduction in total state aid to community and STEM schools on an annual basis.

Other major state aid reductions occurred in Medicaid spending, representing a \$210 million cut, and higher education spending,

Cincinnati principal raises cash to buy van for single mom of 7

Belinda Tubbs-Wallace, the principal of **Cincinnati Public Schools' Rockdale Academy**, noticed a single mother of seven children was facing a major challenge.

"She was walking to work when she left (the school)," Tubbs-Wallace told a local TV station. "I realized, wow, that mom walks to work, and she walks home."

Without a vehicle, **Chyrae Colbert** and her children were walking everywhere. Two of her

sons attend Rockdale Academy.

"Whatever we need to do, we don't want to wait on anybody," Colbert said. "We will get to walking."

Now, Colbert and her children are riding everywhere, thanks to Tubbs-Wallace's efforts and her foundation, Home Schools and Community, which helps struggling families.

Tubbs-Wallace called on her friends to help, and "everyone began to donate from \$5 to \$15."

Soon, she had enough to buy Colbert and her sons a van. When they took what would be their last walk to Rockdale Academy, the family was surprised with the vehicle upon their arrival. The moment was captured on video.

"When I got up there, I saw all these people," Colbert said. "I was like, 'Oh my gosh. What is going on?' And that car was right there behind all those people. It was amazing."

representing a \$110 million cut.

Amid the cuts, advocates are demanding that Congress act again on another spending package to address the pandemic. State and local government leaders, including school district representatives, have rallied for additional aid, as only \$31 billion has currently been spent by Congress on K-12 and higher education — a fraction of the \$100 billion spent during the Great Recession.

DeWine's choice to first implement state spending reductions over other options ostensibly shifts the gaze of Statehouse observers to the

historically high \$2.7 billion budget stabilization fund. This fund, also referred to as the rainy day fund, is a pot of money intended to fill budget shortfalls in state spending obligations. In 2008, it totaled just over \$1 billion, but due to the ensuing financial collapse and its prolonged effects, it dwindled to a meager 89 cents in 2010. Over the next decade, Ohio grew its rainy day fund to a robust \$2.7 billion.

Critics and supporters alike have called for DeWine to use the rainy day fund in lieu of cuts. However, DeWine and Lt. Gov. **Jon Husted** have stated that revenue losses from the pandemic likely will

exceed Ohio's reserves over time. DeWine also has said that cuts could continue into FY 2021.

Nevertheless, many Ohioans have acknowledged that it is "raining," including DeWine himself. They claim now is the time to use the saved-up money. But the longtime Ohio politician and first-term governor has not relented in his measured response to the crisis, declaring "The 'rain' is not a passing spring shower — it could be a long, cold, lingering storm, and we should not use it until it is necessary."
