Duke Energy tax appeal threatens school district revenues

OSBA, the Buckeye Association of School Administrators, Ohio Association of School Business Officials and southwest Ohio schools are challenging Duke Energy's appeal to lower its personal property valuation by 40%. Duke just recently began telling schools that it was reducing its tax payments, despite filing the appeal in December. The move comes just before the end of the fiscal year and will have a devastating financial impact on many school districts. There also is concern that other utilities might seek tax cuts, leading to more funding losses. OSBA urges its members to contact state officials on this issue. On July 5, 1955, Ohio Gov. Frank Lausche signed legislation allowing local school boards to pay dues to a state association, setting the stage for the creation of the Ohio School Boards Association. Two previous attempts to pass the legislation had failed. OSBA convened in Columbus for its first official meeting on Dec. 3, 1955.







LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Several education bills await lawmakers' return

The Ohio House and Senate have recessed for the summer for the campaign season. Below is a summary of bills impacting education that received some attention prior to the recess.

Seat belts on school buses

House Bill (HB) 448, sponsored by Rep. **Kathleen Chandler** (D-Kent), would require all school buses purchased, leased or rented after Jan. 1, 2014, to transport students to and from school to be equipped with a seat belt assembly for all passengers. Chandler has introduced this type of legislation in previous sessions of the General Assembly. However, it received immediate attention in the final days before the legislature recessed. The House Transportation and Infrastructure

committee passed the bill out of committee after its second hearing. It was passed the same day of a tragic fatal bus accident that occurred at Tri-Valley Local (Muskingum).

Members of the committee acknowledged more debate is needed on the bill.

the legislation would require schools to:

- expand their existing student anti-harassment policies to cover incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying that occur on school buses or off school property;
- include in their policies a prohibition against bullying by electronic means (cyberbullying);
- provide training on their antiharassment policies as a part of the in-service training required for all teachers, administrators, counselors, nurses and school psychologists.

HB 520 has a companion bill in the Senate, SB 126, sponsored by Sen. **Teresa Fedor** (D-Toledo). HB 520 had sponsor testimony in the House Education Committee prior to the summer recess and SB 126 is being heard in the Senate Education Committee.

Budget planning commission

Even though the General Assembly is officially on summer recess, some events are happening at the Statehouse. The new legislative Budget Planning and Management Commission recently met for the first time. The committee was created last year in HB 1 and is charged with

Students create physical therapy tool from Wii remote

By adapting Wii technology, students from Fremont City's Ross High School and Tiffin City's Columbian High School engineered a tool to help occupational and physical therapy patients and their therapists assess patients' progress.

Described as dynamic digital rehabilitation, Ross student Andrew Nichelson and Columbian students Seth Sholl and Cody Semer developed the idea for their senior project in the Vanguard-Sentinel JVSD Technology Center's

computer technician program. Initially intended to be a data glove for computer gaming, the seniors changed their plan after talking to Sholl's father, a physical therapist.

Semer told a local newspaper that the Wii remote is connected to a computer via Bluetooth signals. On the computer screen the signals mimic mouse movements that indicate the patient's range of motion. This information then can be sent to the patient's therapist.

The boys worked with

Vanguard-Sentinel teachers Floyd Collins and Terry Ritchie; an instructor at Terra Community College; and an occupational therapist at a local hospital.

"They learned more from this project than can be taught from books or in the classroom," Collins told the newspaper. "They learned what it is to be a team and working for a common goal, relying on each other's strengths and overcoming their weaknesses."

reviewing the state's budget circumstances and making recommendations ahead of next year's full-blown budget deliberations.

Members of the commission are:

The six-member group recently began its work with a presentation from the Legislative Service Commission (LSC), the nonpartisan research arm of the General Assembly. Part of LSC's presentation included a chart detailing the differences between what the governor's administration and Senate Republicans consider "one-time" money in the fiscal year 2010-11 biennial budget.

Regardless of what is defined as one-time money, both Sykes and Jones, co-chairs of the committee, issued statements at the beginning of the hearing urging bipartisan cooperation for this early review process.

Members clarified that the group is not charged with writing and debating the fiscal year 2012-13 budget, however, they are going to focus on identifying overarching strategies for the next governor and General Assembly that will drive upcoming budget developments.

The committee's next hearing will feature presentations from the Office of Budget and Management and the National Conference of State Legislatures. After that, the committee is not likely to meet again until the lame-duck session following the November elections.
