The pad wars are coming

The outbreak of pads has begun with the introduction of the iPad, to be followed by this pad and that pad and all the other pads. Are these computing devices everything they are hyped up to be? Maybe yes and maybe no!

According to Moore's law on technology, computing power will double every 18 to 24 months, manifesting itself in the continuous stream of updated computing gear

But should everyone step to the vendor's beat and start trading in their laptops for pads? The primary question is, "how do you plan to use the pad?" Is it a research tool for students? A digital

reader? Can you replace a teacher's laptop with a pad? Can it be used in place of a pad of paper? These questions need to be addressed before investing in a new technology without a proven track record.

Here are a few questions to ask an administrator who suggests that pads are the way to go in your school district:

• What current computing devices will the pads replace?

• Will the pads run all the software that we need to support instruction?

• Can we expect to receive five years of service from a pad?

• Do the pads have the hardware capabilities we have with our laptop or desktop computers?

• What is the cost per pad versus the cost for a laptop or desktop computer?

As you can see, the primary considerations are how and where a pad would fit into a school environment. While sleek and "cool," pads need to be evaluated based on the instructional requirements, purchase price and return on investment (ROI). School districts have come to rely on laptop carts and computer labs as multifunctional computing classrooms. Pads probably won't fit *Continued on page 7*

School bus reading program promotes learning and safety

Inspired by a TV news story, a North Fork Local (Licking) school bus driver decided she would start a reading program for her young passengers. Terri Glassburn shared the idea with Superintendent Scott Hartley and Transportation Supervisor Dale Broseus and received enthusiastic approval to move ahead.

The program encourages students to read books, magazines, spelling lists, study guides and other materials. Once they are

in this model.

So when and where would a pad become beneficial for students? Pads have a "wow" factor and sometimes this alone encourages students to use technology for learning. Pads work well for reading digital books, researching information on the Web or watching short video clips. One way to look at it is if you don't need a keyboard to accomplish the work, a pad may be the right choice.

Here are a few questions to gauge the viability of pads in your district:

• Do your buildings provide adequate wireless capabilities to support pads?

• Can you afford to support

home, students write summaries of what they read on their ride. In the first two days Glassburn collected 13 summaries, which she gave to teachers to show them what their kids accomplished on the bus.

The driver kicked off the program by giving her riders homemade bookmarks personalized with their names and bearing the phrase, "I'm proud of you." Glassburn plans to give further incentives, including a grand prize to be presented to one

different sets of hardware to accomplish instruction?

• Will your teachers be able to adapt instruction to make use of the pads?

• Does the cost of the pad meet your ROI for technology hardware?

• Will the pads you buy today still be effective teaching instruments in three years?

In the next two years you can expect to see an explosion of pads with increased speed, interoperability with external hardware (keyboards, USB devices, etc.) and a growing catalog of instructional software written specifically for these devices. Make no mistake about it — pads ar e here to stay, but before you jump student each month.

Not only does the program encourage reading, it also promotes safety, because students who are in their seats reading are less likely to misbehave. With the bus holding the equivalent of more than two classrooms of children, the program also extends the learning day for dozens of students.

The district hopes to expand the program to other buses and has launched a book drive.
