Learner-Centered Education

The integration of personalized and competency-based learning to place students at the center of their learning, using blended learning strategies as a vehicle.



Why Learner-Centered Education?

Empowering students to be **future ready**, by

- »<u>engaging</u> them through relevant, authentic, experiential learning.
- »<u>taking ownership</u> of their learning, so that they become explorers capable of **lifelong learning**, leveraging their curiosity to solve real-world problems.
- »graduating with knowledge, skills, dispositions, and overall well-being necessary to succeed in college, career, and civic outcomes.

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Learner-Centered Education

Personalized	Tailoring learning experiences for each student's strengths, needs, interests, and readiness.
Blended	Integration of digital tools as a vehicle that enables a learner-centered educational environment.
Competency- Based	Based on mastery of skills and knowledge within an adaptive, flexible learning environment, allowing students to progress as they demonstrate mastery.

Traditional	Personalized, Learner-Centered		
Teacher as instructor, delivering	Teacher as facilitator of learning		
Students as passive participants	Students as active learners, engaging in co- designing multi-modality learning experiences		
Academic content organized and delivered by age or grade level	Academic content organized by readiness, demonstration of mastery, relevance, career pathways (Adaptive, Learning Progressions)		
Teaching primarily focused on delivery of academic content knowledge	Learning focused on 21 st century skills, lifelong learning, whole child development, in addition to foundational content knowledge		
Learning resources primarily limited to the teacher and print material (textbooks)	Learning resources accessed through multi- media

- 5. Develop communications plan to engage parents and your business community in understanding these shifts
