State superintendent calls for eliminating some state, local testing

State Superintendent of Public Instruction **Paolo DeMaria** proposed reducing the number of student assessments during a June 12 presentation to the State Board of Education. According to the Gongwer News Service, DeMaria proposed eliminating the fourth-grade social studies exam; the WorkKeys exam used in career-technical schools; and the English language arts I and American government end-of-course exams. He also recommended that districts eliminate local assessments linked to the Ohio Teacher Evaluation System and disclose lists of all district-required tests.

State Board of Education votes to recover \$60 million from ECOT

The State Board of Education has decided the Electronic Classroom of Tomorrow (ECOT) must repay \$60 million in taxpayer funds that the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) said the online school improperly received. The board moved to recover the funds after accepting a hearing officer's report that ECOT inflated its 2015-2016 school year enrollment by about 9,000 students. ODE and ECOT have been engaged in legal clashes for more than a year over the way ODE calculates online enrollment. Other legal moves by ECOT are pending, and the case is expected to end up before the Ohio Supreme Court.

Nearly 80 years later, Marks-Bolton received an honorary diploma from **Lake Local**'s **(Wood)** Lake High School.

"You know it bothered me in all the years," the 90-year-old told a local TV station.

Marks-Bolton's graduation journey began in 2013 when **Nikki Bazzoli**, an English teacher at Lake Local's Lake Middle School, took a group of eighth-graders to a Holocaust remembrance ceremony where Marks-Bolton spoke about love and forgiveness.

State legislature wrapping up biennial budget work

The state biennial budget process is nearing completion. Over the last several months, many issues and ideas have been discussed before various legislative committees with hope for improved funding for K-12 education and less restrictive mandates placed on public school districts.

Most recently, the Senate introduced its version of the budget — Amended Substitute House Bill 49 — adding some new items into the legislation along with many revisions to the Housepassed version. The following is a list of funding-related items added or modified in the Senate's version:

In the school-funding formula, the Senate version changes perpupil core opportunity aid to \$6,010 in fiscal year (FY) 2018 while retaining the House's proposal of \$6,020 in that category for FY 2019. The substitute bill also maintains the executive and House versions for the transportation funding formula: 37.5% minimum state share in FY 2018 and 25% in FY 2019. However, a new provision eliminates state funding for payment in lieu of transportation.

For districts on the transitional aid guarantee, the substitute bill keeps the executive and House proposal to reduce funding for school districts experiencing declining enrollment. However, the "look-back" period is narrowed to two years, rather than the five years called for in the executive and House proposals.

Reductions are based on the percentage change in total average daily membership between FY 2014 and FY 2016. The same thresholds for reductions that were included in the House-passed version still apply. Enrollment losses between 5% and 10% will receive a scaled guarantee amount between 95% and 100%.

The transitional aid guarantee includes amounts for careertechnical education, careertechnical associated services, the third-grade reading bonus and the graduation bonus.

For districts with capped funding, the Senate version changes the gain cap percentage to 3%. Districts with enrollment increases greater than 3% between FY 2014 and FY 2016 will be allowed to see greater growth, up to 5.5% in FY 2018 and 6% in FY 2019. The percentage growth is a *Continued on page 6*

scaled amount, corresponding with the district's percentage change in total enrollment between 3% and 5.5% in FY 2018 and between 3% and 6% in FY 2019. The increase in each year is based on the previous year's state aid.

A cap offset payment was established in the House version and retained by the Senate. If a district is subject to the gain cap and experiencing a net decrease in combined state aid (formula aid

plus tangible personal property (TPP)/public utility tangible personal property (PUTPP) tax reimbursements), the district will be guaranteed at FY 2017 levels, not to exceed the capped amount for FY 2018.

Funding provisions for JVSDs are essentially the same as for traditional districts for per-pupil amounts, gain cap percentage and reductions for enrollment loss. However, the Senate removed a

provision of current law that requires JVSDs to spend at least 75% of the state career-technical funding it receives on costs directly associated with careertechnical educational programs and not more than 25% on personnel expenditures.

For districts affected by the devaluation of electricity generation facilities, the Senate version retains House language by allowing the state-funding formula to help them sooner. This provision is expected to be updated or modified in the final Senate version or through the conference committee process.

The Senate substitute bill includes provisions from Senate Bill 36, legislation that reduces current agricultural use values, which the Ohio Education Policy Institute estimates would result in a statewide 30% reduction. In Senate testimony on June 15, OSBA highlighted the impact this would have on districts around the state and the increases residential taxpayers likely will see as a result of this shift.

For districts receiving TPP and PUTPP replacement payments, the phase-down schedule will be modified in FY 2018 to allow them to receive the greater of the following:

• The district's TPP replacement payment for FY 2017, including the TPP supplement, minus 3.5% of the district's FY 2017 total resources, consisting of combined local tax revenue, state aid and

Student inventors' mobile kit pinpoints food allergens

As a preschooler, **Evan Garner** had a life-threatening allergic reaction after tasting an egg.

Now 11, Evan and a fellow **New Albany-Plain Local (Franklin)** student hope their mobile kit will save others from reactions to food allergens.

Evan, a fifth-grader, and 13-year-old **Will Underhill**, a seventh-grader, invented AllerGo!, a portable kit with allergen test strips for eggs or milk.

The pair was among 300

students invited to compete in the National Invention Convention and Entrepreneurship Expo in June at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office in Alexandria, Va.

Evan and Will worked with a biochemist from Columbus State Community College and the food safety company, Neogen Corp., which donated test strips for the allergen kits.

Each test strip contains monoclonal antibodies, which

cause an allergic reaction.

"That's the cell that reacts to (the allergen)," Will told a local newspaper.

The food is safe to eat if two lines appear and match the lines already on the test strip.

Additional lines indicate the degree to which the allergen is present in the food. One additional line means the food contains a small amount of the allergen.

TPP reimbursement.

• The district's TPP/PUTPP FY 2017 reimbursement payments, excluding the TPP supplement, minus 5/8 mill of the district's three-year average property valuation for tax years 2014-16, which is the phase-down in current law. Beginning in FY 2018, TPP/ PUTPP reimbursement payments for JVSDs would phase down at a rate of 3.5% of the district's total resources rather than the current 5/8-mill rate in current law.

For ESCs, the Senate version increases the per-pupil state payment amount in each fiscal year to \$26 for high-performing ESCs and \$24 for other ESCs. These amounts are \$1 per pupil higher than the House proposal.

The Senate removed the House proposal for the College Credit Plus (CCP) program that would have required a C grade or better in a CCP course before credit could be awarded. The Senate also modified language making it permissive for the chancellor of the Ohio Department of Higher Education to approve agreements that go below the funding floor amounts rather than requiring approval as is the case under current law. The substitute bill also removes the House provision that divided the responsibility for CCP textbooks equally between school districts and institutions of higher education.

In addition, the Senate substitute version eliminates the Straight A Fund program.

The Senate Finance Committee will consider additional amendments the week of June 19, with a scheduled floor vote by the Senate on June 21. A conference committee is likely to decide between the differences in the House and Senate versions prior to presenting the final legislation to the governor on June 30.

Continue to watch for OSBA communications with updated information as the budget process comes to an end.
