

Badges: Admission to all 2013 OSBA Capital Conference and Trade Show activities is limited to those wearing the official conference badge. Groups of attendees have different colored badges for easy identification.

**Bookstore:** OSBA is operating a bookstore for conference attendees to purchase books, clothing, plaques and other items. The bookstore is located in C 110. 



The future of public education through the eyes

of a legislator

A former state treasurer, Rep. Kevin L. Bovce (D-Columbus) was appointed to the Ohio House of Representatives in May 2012. As state treasurer, Boyce implemented a series of successful changes through which he reduced operating costs by 12%, slashed pension fund management fees by 63% and launched the nation's first Web-based training for treasurers' continued learning. Prior to his appointment as state treasurer, Boyce served eight years as a member of Columbus City Council, establishing a record of fiscal integrity and performancebased budget practices. He previously served as executive director of KnowledgeWorks Ohio, a nonprofit organization working to improve Ohio's school systems through public development and advocacy. During his tenure at KnowledgeWorks, he was a part of a team that invested more than \$100 million in Ohio's public school systems, implementing cutting-edge education models such as Project GRAD, Small Schools and Early College.
