

Teen Suicide

- MHS has had two successful student suicides in the past 14 months
 - More have attempted suicide
- In the next 24 hours, in our nation, 1,439 teens will attempt suicide
- Teen suicide rate is 33% higher than adult suicide rate

Statistics on Youth Suicide

- In 2007, suicide was third leading cause of death for young people ages 15 to 24
- Deaths by suicide:
 - ² Children ages 10 to 14 − 0.9 per 100,000
 - * Adolescents ages 15 to 19 6.9 per 100,000

Risk Factors for Youth Suicide

- What are some risk factors for suicide attempts?
 - depression and other mental disorders
 - alcohol and other substance abuse
 - * separation or divorce
 - physical or sexual abuse

Indicators for Youth Suicide

- What indicators show a youth's risk for suicide?
 - Teen boys are four times as likely to die by suicide than teen girls
 - Ethnic groups
 - Highest for Native Americans and Alaska Natives
 15.4 deaths per 100,000 teens
 - White, Hispanic, and African-American teens
 - 4.7, 3.0, and 2.7 per 100,000, respectively

Indicators for Youth Suicide

- What indicators show a youth's risk for suicide?
 - Gay and bisexual teens are especially at risk
 - 28% of gay and bisexual teenage boys and 20% of gay and bisexual teenage girls have attempted suicide

Identifying Students at Risk

- American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP)
 - A dramatic change in personality
 - Relationship problems, especially with a romantic partner
 - A drop in grades or quality of schoolwork
 - Alcohol or drug abuse
 - * A change in eating or sleeping habits
 - Having trouble concentrating
 - Giving away prized possessions
 - Writing notes or poems about death
 - Talking about suicide, even jokingly

Identifying Students at Risk

- AAP recommends:
 - Act quickly.
 - Suicide is preventable, but quick action is important.
 - Ask about it, and don't be afraid to say the word "suicide."
 - Using the word may help at-risk teenagers understand that someone has heard their cries for help.
 - · Reassure teenagers that you love them.
 - Make sure they know that no matter how bad the problems seem, they can be worked out.
 - Encourage them to talk about their feelings, and listen carefully.
 Don't dismiss the problem or get angry.
 Consult with school mental health and student support services.

 - Seek professional help.


Statistics on Bullying


- 160,000 American school children miss school daily because they don't feel safe at school
- 13% of U.S. youth report to be victims of peer abuse in some form or another
 - Youth of color report more abuse based on race/ religion
 - Youth in special education classes report more abuse based on disability

Implications for Educators: Less than half of our moderately to very severely affected students tell an adult at school when they are mistreated by their peers. Important to identify safe ways for students to communicate with adults at school about their negative peer interactions. http://www.youthvoiceproject.com/YVPMarch2010.pdf





Youth Voice Research Project

- Three patterns emerge from the data:
 - Accessing support from peers and adults was most helpful
 - Suggesting action by victims were least helpful as reported by victims
 - Telling them to solve their problems for themselves • EXAMPLE – fight back, stand up for yourself
 - * Telling an adult at school was only rated as helpful
 - only slightly more than it was rated as harmful

Youth Voice Research Project

- Conclusions drawn from the data:
 - * Listening to me and checked in with me
 - · Most likely to be seen as making things better
 - Encouraging advice was seen as most helpful
 - You did the right thing by coming to me
 - · It's not your fault
 - Things will get better
 - Blaming the victim is most harmful
 - You need to tone it down a bit Stop tattling

- Mandatory Reporting Guidelines
 - * When should adults contact professional services?
- Confidentiality
 - Students need to know help comes from involving others
- What to do if . . .
 - * Teachers need to feel comfortable



What can you do if you're bullied?

- Avoid the bully and use the buddy system
- Hold the anger
- Act brave, walk away, and ignore the bully
- Tell an adult
- Talk about it (IT'S NOTYOUR FAULT)
- Remove the incentive
- Stay off bullying websites


