## Research confirms most students respond positively to 10 core drivers of engagement

As schools plan for shifts among in-person, hybrid and remote schooling, leaders and educators must move forward with better, more authentic measures of engagement that reflect:

- the kinds of fluid learning environments students are now experiencing regularly;
- an accurate accounting of engagement that attends to each student's reasons for engaging *and* disengaging.

Recent events also have underscored the enduring need for education systems to promote racial equity and dismantle systemic structures of racism and exclusion for increased student engagement.

Whether learning occurs in brick-and-mortar schools or in virtual environments, student engagement drives an impressive array of student outcomes. Few would argue, however, that counting logins to devices, appearances on video and audio conferencing platforms or emailing back a worksheet constitutes valid and useful measures of genuine engagement in learning. While these approaches existed before COVID-19, the current pandemic has laid bare how poorly, if at all, we've been addressing and assessing student engagement.

Despite this observation, systems across the U.S. are still trying to capture and enhance student engagement by tracking these behaviors. To increase student engagement, it's important to focus on 10 core drivers of engagement:

- access and opportunity
- evidence of high expectations
- relevance and meaning
- autonomy, self-direction and ownership
- collaboration
- authenticity and responsiveness
- self-efficacy
- self-regulation
- relational connection
- fun
