#### **TEACHER RECRUITMENT & RETENTION**

#### **HOW CAN DISTRICTS, STATES SUSTAIN TEACHER APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS?**

School districts and states are increasingly using teacher apprenticeship programs—where paraprofessionals, high-school students, and local community members earn credentials while working in classrooms—to help address teacher shortages and build long-term talent pipelines, but sustaining these programs can be challenging amid tight local budgets and uncertain state and federal support; speakers at a *National Center for Grow Your Own* webinar highlighted strategies such as reallocating local teacher vacancy funds, bundling cohorts to negotiate lower tuition with partner colleges, and tapping federal education funds like Title II, Title III, IDEA and Perkins, while state efforts feature grants (e.g., Nebraska’s use of a Department of Labor apprenticeship

expansion grant) and legislative funding (such as Maryland’s investment in debt-free pathways) to scale and sustain apprenticeship initiatives. Read more from *K-12 Dive* [here](#).

## **BROADBAND CONNECTIVITY & E-RATE**

### **SINCE E-RATE CUTS, SCHOOLS MAKE DIFFICULT CHOICES ON HOTSPOTS**

Since the Federal Communications Commission reversed a recent expansion of the E-rate program that had allowed schools and libraries to get discounted funding for Wi-Fi hotspots and school bus internet, many K-12 districts are scrambling to connect students who lack reliable home broadband and are facing tough budget decisions, with some choosing to cut hotspot lending programs or limit devices to the highest-need students because they can no longer count on federal reimbursements and must find other funding or absorb the costs themselves, a shift that leaders say threatens to widen the “homework gap” for low-income and rural learners. ## **2. Budget and Appropriations Wrap-Up**

Last week, Congress was in recess during the third week of another partial federal government shutdown that came after Congress failed to pass final appropriations legislation before January 30<sup>th</sup>, the expiration date of the latest continuing resolution that was funding the operations of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). DHS remains unfunded, triggering a lapse for agencies such as the Transportation Security Administration, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the Secret Service. Essential functions at DHS continue, but many workers are either furloughed or working without pay, and broader operational impacts are anticipated if the impasse continues. Congressional Democrats and Republicans remain in a standoff primarily over proposed reforms to immigration enforcement, including Democrats’ calls for body cameras and judicial warrants for certain actions by federal officers — demands that Republicans have resisted.

Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) said Democrats are seeking “commonsense proposals” for oversight of immigration operations and questioned why Republicans are unwilling to adopt them, framing the demands as aligned with law enforcement practices nationwide. Senator Markwayne Mullin (R-OK), while open to body cameras and additional training, balked at other proposals, saying his priority is ensuring ICE can perform its duties without exposing agents to intimidation. Republican leaders in the House have expressed confidence that a funding deal could be approved by the middle of this week when lawmakers return from recess.

Governors convened in Washington, DC, for the NGA Winter Meeting over the weekend. The meeting traditionally includes solutions-driven conversations on pressing state policy issues, with education listed as one of the major discussion areas alongside energy, economic growth, and artificial intelligence. This year’s meeting has already made news for a number of non-education reasons, but the agenda was expected to address ambitious education themes, such as linking education to workforce needs and skills training, emphasizing the role of career and technical education, apprenticeships, dual-enrollment programs, and other pathways that prepare students for in-demand jobs.

Looking to this week, Congress will reconvene and host President Donald Trump on Tuesday for his 2026 State of the Union Address. President Trump is widely anticipated to emphasize themes

of economic growth and affordability, including lower costs for families and stronger U.S. economic performance, building on recent remarks about strong economic indicators and cost-of-living concerns. In addition to economic topics, the address is expected to reiterate key policy priorities of the administration, such as immigration enforcement and national security, as well as broader visions for the year ahead. A Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 budget request is expected soon thereafter and will set the stage for the work of education advocates during what has become a nearly constant “appropriations season.”

### **How does this impact State School Board Associations?**

It’s possible that prolonged instability at agencies like FEMA could complicate reimbursement processes tied to disasters or security grants. At the same time, the upcoming State of the Union and anticipated FY 2027 budget request signal that school boards should prepare for continued volatility in federal education priorities — especially around workforce development, CTE, and affordability — and remain engaged in advocacy as Congress enters what is shaping up to be another prolonged appropriations cycle.

### **3. In Brief – Last Week in Washington**

#### **AEI EXAMINES THE IMPACT OF CLASSROOM TECHNOLOGY ON LEARNING**

On Tuesday, the American Enterprise Institute (AEI) hosted a [virtual event](#) featuring neuroscientist and former educator Jared Cooney Horvath to discuss his new [book](#), *The Digital Delusion: How Classroom Technology Harms Our Kids’ Learning—and How to Help Them Thrive Again*. The discussion was moderated by AEI’s Frederick Hess. Throughout the event, Horvath argued that the long-standing trend of rising IQ scores, known as the [Flynn effect](#), has reversed in recent years, which he attributed in part to the widespread expansion of classroom technology. He asserted that while online platforms can increase student engagement, engagement does not necessarily translate into meaningful learning, and he outlined three primary shortcomings of technology-based education. First, Horvath contended that screen-based reading weakens spatial memory and encourages skimming rather than deep comprehension. Second, he argued that digital interfaces disrupt the biological and empathetic interactions between students and teachers that support effective learning. Third, he maintained that technology reduces “friction,” which he described as the productive struggle necessary for long-term learning and retention. Although he acknowledged that certain tools, such as targeted tutoring systems and remediation programs, show promise, Horvath emphasized that most research does not demonstrate consistent, large-scale learning gains from classroom technology. As a policy response, Horvath proposed a temporary moratorium on personal devices in K–12 classrooms, along with technology audits and independent evaluations before any reintegration. He concluded that, despite the practical challenges of such reforms, parents and policymakers should carefully reconsider whether classroom technology meaningfully improves student learning outcomes before continuing to expand its use.
