LEGISLATIVE REPORT

House budget bill includes new school-funding formula

The Ohio House of Representatives sent the Ohio Senate its version of the main operating budget bill, Substitute House Bill (HB) 110, on April 21. The bill, which funds state government operations for the

upcoming fiscal year (FY) 2022 and 2023 biennium, also contains a host of public policy changes. The House version contains state and federal appropriations from the state General Revenue Fund (GRF) totaling \$35.30 billion for FY 2022 and \$39.41 billion for FY 2023, increases of 3.4% and 11.7%, respectively.

For education, the House established a new school-funding formula to be phased in over a six-*Continued on page 6*

year period, with a general phase-in amount of 16.67% in FY 2022 and 33.33% in FY 2023. The proposed formula, often referred to as the Fair School Funding Plan (FSFP), contains the provisions of HB 1 with some modifications. In establishing a formula, the House discarded Gov. **Mike DeWine's** hallmark education initiative: the Student Wellness and Success Fund (SWSF), which contained \$1.1 billion in twoyear spending under his executive proposal.

Overall, the House plan spends \$8.93 billion in FY 2022 and \$9.14 billion in FY 2023 to support the funding plan. Of that amount, \$7.15 billion in FY 2022 and \$7.25 billion in FY 2023 are sourced from the GRF, with \$1.28 billion in FY 2022 and \$1.29 billion in FY 2023 coming from lottery profits.

The House plan replaces the current \$6,020 per-pupil formula amount with a variable per-pupil base cost for each district based on various FY 2018 average staff salary and district spending inputs and certain pupil-to-staff ratios. For FY 2022, the statewide average base cost per pupil for traditional school districts is estimated at \$7,202. Instead of the current State Share Index, the House plan computes a per-pupil local capacity amount for each district based on a district's property value and income. This local capacity amount is subtracted from the district's per-pupil base cost to determine the state share of the base cost.

The plan also includes other components to direct additional

funding to districts with lower capacities to raise local revenues, to address students who have different needs and to support districts facing different challenges. These components account for students receiving special education and related services, economically disadvantaged students, gifted students, students receiving careertechnical education services and English learners, among others. Unlike current law, the plan funds students where they are educated, rather than where they reside, resulting in direct funding for community school, STEM school, open enrollment and voucher students.

The plan establishes three separate guarantees, one of which ensures that a district's state aid in FY 2022 and FY 2023 will not fall below its combined FY 2021 funding from foundation aid prior to executive-ordered budget reductions — after school choice transfers, SWSF allocations and the enrollment growth supplement.

Both the original FSFP and the House-passed version of HB 110 increased the base per-pupil amount used to calculate disadvantaged pupil impact aid (DPIA), previously called economically disadvantaged funds, from \$272 to \$422. The FSFP required this increase and the increases in funding for ESCs to be paid out first before all other components of the formula. However, the House version of the budget removed this priority funding provision. It also phased in the DPIA increase at 0% in FY 2022 and 14% in FY 2023.

Another change between the FSFP and the House-passed version of the budget bill pertained to the SWSF. The House maintained the proposed \$1.1 billion in spending on SWSF, but redirected its purpose to paying for DPIA and a portion of the base cost component of the formula.

State estimates indicate six school districts would lose funding over the first two years of the plan, including East Knox Local (Knox), Jefferson Township Local (Montgomery), Patrick Henry Local (Henry), United Local (Columbiana), Valley Local (Scioto) and Wynford Local (Crawford). Meanwhile, 96 districts, or 16%, appear to lose funding over the sixyear phase-in period.

The House also made several policy changes to HB 110, including: • extending to Dec. 31, 2021, the current temporary ability for boards of education and other public bodies to meet via electronic technology, which is set expire on July 1, 2021;

• eliminating DeWine's proposed requirement for high school students to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid in order to graduate from high school;

• creating a legislative panel to oversee and review the distribution and spending of federal COVID emergency funds received by school districts and others;

• permitting high school juniors to opt out of the requirement to take *Continued on page 7*

Cincinnati school wins Ohio's only national Green Ribbon award

Cincinnati Public's James N. Gamble Montessori High School is one of the nation's 27 Green Ribbon Schools honored this year.

The U.S. Department of Education recognizes Green Ribbon Schools for reducing environmental impact and costs; improving the health and wellness of schools, students and staff; and providing effective environmental and sustainability education.

Gamble Montessori was the only Ohio school honored this

year.

"I am incredibly proud of our students, teachers, staff, parents and community," Principal **Taylor Porter** said in a news release. "We have infused respect and appreciation for the natural world into the Montessori-based education we provide our students. This manifests in multiple ways, including through our Agricultural Education program, the gardens, orchards, and entrepreneurship that fuel our annual Montessori Market and best-in-class water purification, smart lighting and energy efficient facilities."

Students enrolled in the agriculture program most recently held an event on April 10 with dozens of socially distanced local vendors selling fresh fruits, vegetables, candles and honey.

Located in Westwood, the high school serves over 500 students in grades seven through 12.

• maintaining DeWine's proposed requirement for school districts to offer and pay for student access to computer science curricula;

• maintaining DeWine's proposal to prohibit districts from using mass transit to transport resident students in grades kindergarten through eight who are enrolled in community or chartered nonpublic schools unless the student's school authorizes such transportation;

• maintaining DeWine's temporary prohibition on the establishment of new academic distress commissions through the 2022-2023 school year;

• requiring a report on the costeffectiveness of the College Credit Plus Program;

• requiring a district to develop a plan for using its DPIA funding in coordination with a board of alcohol, drug and mental health services and another specified community partner, including an ESC, a county board of developmental disabilities, a community-based mental health treatment provider and other specified entities.

HB 110 is currently pending in the Ohio Senate where it is receiving informal hearings in various committees.
