State superintendent resigns June 3; Siddens named interim

Ohio Superintendent of Public Instruction **Stephen D. Dackin** resigned on June 3, less than a month after taking the post. In a letter to State Board of Education President **Charlotte McGuire**, Dackin wrote, "Children whose critical learning years have been disrupted by the pandemic need to be the focus of all our time, attention and creativity." He also refused any compensation for his service in the position. Dr. **Stephanie Siddens** was named interim state superintendent effectively immediately.

EPA offering funding to transition to zero- or low-emission buses

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) new Clean School Bus Program is offering \$500 million to replace diesel school buses with zero- or low-emission buses through the 2022 Clean School Bus Rebates. School districts can apply for these rebates through Aug. 19; they will be notified of their selection status in October. 

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Lawmakers pass flurry of bills before summer recess

Lawmakers departed Capitol Square in early June for their summer recess after a marathon session in which several bills were sent to Gov. **Mike DeWine**. The bills fund capital projects, prescribe training requirements for the arming of school staff and modify how property tax ballots are displayed, among others. House and Senate members also approved several bills from their own respective chambers, paving the way for second-chamber consideration in the lame-duck session, which begins after the Nov. 3 general election. Just four joint session dates remain in the twoyear legislative session, with the next session date on which both chambers have a scheduled session being Nov. 16. The following bills are headed to DeWine for his signature:

• House Bill (HB) 583 — Originally a bill to extend by two years the temporary flexibility for school districts to hire substitute teachers, HB 583 was substantially revised by *Continued on page 6*

the Senate to, among other provisions, modify the elements of the school-funding formula; remove proration and income upper-level limits for income-based vouchers under the Educational Choice Scholarship expansion program; modify eligibility for the Cleveland voucher program; delay to the 2023-24 school year the requirement to begin administering dyslexia screenings of students in grades K-six; and delay the deadline for the bill's study on substitute teacher shortages to Dec. 31, 2022. The substitute teacher provisions were maintained in the final version and will be effective through the 2023-24 school year.

• HB 140 — After nine months of inaction, the Senate Ways and Means Committee scheduled a lastminute hearing to approve the bill that modifies ballot language and property tax levies. Hours after the committee passed the measure, the Senate passed the bill by a 22-10 vote. Since the Senate made no changes to the House bill, it bypassed an otherwise required House concurrence vote and proceeded to the governor. A provision similar to HB 140 was included in the biennial budget bill in 2019 but was line-item vetoed by DeWine because he wrote at the time the changes would "be difficult for county auditors to implement, and the required ballot language may seem confusing and contradictory."

• HB 99 — Introduced in response to a 2021 Ohio Supreme Court ruling, HB 99 exempts from basic peace officer training requirements a school employee that is authorized by their district or school to be armed so long as three conditions are met: the authorized individual is not hired in the capacity of a special police officer or security officer; the individual successfully completes 24 hours of initial training and up to eight hours of additional training annually; and public notice is provided by the district or school that it has authorized one or more persons to be armed within a school. The bill also requires an individual authorized to be armed to submit to an annual criminal records check.

The bill was modified by the Senate to create the Ohio School Safety and Crisis Center, within the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS), to provide school safety services, including firearms training, to school districts and private schools. Districts must provide the center with a list of qualified and trained personnel they have authorized to convey deadly weapons or dangerous ordnance into a school safety zone. This list is not a public record under the bill. The Senate also modified the bill to create the Ohio Mobile Training Team, within ODPS, to develop curriculum and provide instruction and training, including firearms training, that individuals may complete to be permitted to convey deadly weapons or dangerous ordnance into a school safety zone. The ODPS director must appoint a chief mobile

training officer to administer the program, adopt additional qualifications for regional mobile training officers and enforce ODPS rules. The ODPS director also must appoint 16 regional mobile training officers who must, among other duties, assist in the development or review of emergency management plans and security protocols, upon the request of school administrators.

• HB 687 — Due largely to the legislative backlog from the months-long legislative redistricting controversy, lawmakers were delayed in initiating their consideration of the capital appropriations bill, which occurs every even-numbered year. As a result of the delay and with little time remaining before the summer recess, the capital budget bill was unveiled and passed in less than a week. HB 687 contains capital appropriations for fiscal years 2023 and 2024 totaling \$3.51 billion. The appropriations are customarily financed from bond proceeds, but HB 687 also uses \$1.5 billion in state General Revenue Fund dollars and one-time funds from the federal American Rescue Plan Act.

Six-hundred million dollars are earmarked for the School Building Program Assistance Fund, which provides the state share of basic project costs to school districts participating in facilities programs overseen by the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC). Another feature of the bill is a onetime appropriation of \$100 million *Continued on page 7*

Toledo City aviation student lands \$50k-a-year job with Delta

Things were looking good for **Toledo City** senior **Jacob Cook**.

Months ahead of graduation, he was working on his pilot's license and had earned multiple training certifications through his coursework at the district's Aerospace & Natural Science Technology Academy of Toledo.

Still, Cook's post-graduation plans remained up in the air. He knew he wanted to use the aviation mechanic skills he learned at school but didn't know where. With some help from academy Principal **Jack Hunter**, Cook landed a job interview in mid-March to become an aircraft maintenance mechanic with Endeavor Air, owned by Delta Air Lines Inc.

A week later, he was offered a job making \$50,000 a year, plus health and other benefits.

"Delta flew in and changed the world," Cook told a local newspaper. "I pulled over to the side of the road and just let out a joyful yell. I could not believe it was happening. It was awesome."

Cook is the first academy student to land a job with the national company a year after a partnership was announced with Delta.

"We've had people who have gone on to work for amazing organizations, but this is really the benefit of the partnership: to be able to get into a company like Delta at a young age," Hunter said. Source: The Blade

in competitive grants of up to \$100,000 per school building to public and private schools for physical security enhancement, equipment or inspection and screening equipment to improve the overall physical security and safety of their buildings. The bill also extends, from one year to two years, the time OFCC must reimburse a school district under the Expedited Local Partnership Program if the district resources applied to its originally calculated portion of the project cost exceeds its recalculated portion.
