The school district's recent bus tours, which include frequent stops for teachers to walk about, also covers each of the feeder neighborhoods for its 10 schools with approximately 6,300 students.

#### Workshop dates and descriptions

#### Sept. 15 — T-Reports and state funding

Examine the data collected annually and reported to the state, and implement a system to work for your district. Learn how that data is converted into your funding flow based upon state budget law and use the valuable data to make operational decisions even when state funding has been reduced or eliminated.

#### Oct. 13 — The budget process — state and local

Transportation is a significant cost factor in every school district. This session will look at the local budget as well as the state education budget and review cost analyses and how to find them, what to do with them and what the numbers mean. To prepare for this class, consider bringing your department budget — whether or not it is under your control.

#### Dec. 1 — Transportation rules and regulations

This course is essential for new transportation administrators and any school administrator involved with transportation services. The rules and regulations — revised and administrative codes — that govern student transportation will be reviewed. The local policy contains the standards to which you are held and can be a liability when your department fails to meet them. This course is an annual part of MTA and is different each year to focus on areas that are particularly sensitive in the current environment.

#### Feb. 2 — Federal regulations, guidance and agencies

School transportation is not only governed by local rules but also is subject to a significant number of federal rules and regulations. We will look at the external impacts on transportation and consider the federal alphabet soup: including FMCSA, NHTSA, NTSB, TSB and ODI. Part of this session will look at various federal studies that continue to be landmarks in the pupil transportation industry.

#### March 2 — Laws, rules and policy — what, how and why

What is the difference between revised code, administrative code and department policy? Are they all mandates that must be followed, or are they just best practice that should be followed? What happens when they conflict? We will look at the technical aspects of various regulatory controls and the process that is invoked in moving an idea for change into policy, rule or revised code. Is this "government 101"? Perhaps, but it is also important for you to understand in the event you want to help influence the future.

#### April 6 — Hot topics — safety, trends and statistics

This final session of the year will look at hot topics in the school transportation industry. As part of that review, we will look at the never-ending discussion on passenger restraints, review crash studies completed by the National Transportation Safety Board, look at Ohio school bus accident statistics and leave the door open for attendees to bring up topics that are important in their districts. While we explore these hot topics, an underlying focus is also on how to identify the learning points in each of these areas and to share them with the staff that delivers our front-line transportation services.



became OSBA president-elect.

**OSBA** Chief Financial Officer Allison Morris briefed trustees on the association's finances for the first half of 2021. Alex Bey, a portfolio specialist at Johnson Investment Counsel, provided a performance update on the association's investments, and Nick Waddell, senior manager at RSM US LLP, updated trustees on OSBA's completed 2020 financial audit. The trustees voted to approve a report from the OSBA Audit Committee as well as the 2020 audited financial statements and communications to the board.

The trustees also approved an amendment to the Southwest

Region's bylaws to clarify language regarding region executive committee members who serve on JVSD boards of education. The new language removed the requirement that a board member serving on the regional executive committee must first be on a local board of education before becoming a JVSD or career center board member.

Director of Legislative Services Jennifer Hogue provided an overview of the recently passed biennial budget bill, House Bill (HB) 110. A key component of the bill is the inclusion of a new school-funding plan. The bill adopted the Fair School Funding Plan, with some modifications, providing for just the first two years of the plan's phase-in. Hogue said work was needed to ensure the remainder of the plan is funded.

Other modifications include eliminating the oversight commission and cost studies for the categorical components.

In addition, HB 110 ends the practice of deducting school funding from districts and using it to pay for charter schools and vouchers. Now these entities will be directly funded with state funding, which Hogue described as a "huge win."

include a new transportation funding formula that will incentivize and reward efficiency and more accurately reflect the true cost of transporting charter and nonpublic school students; changes to the payment in lieu of transportation process; and the inclusion of a process for districts to be relieved of academic distress commission oversight. You can read an in-depth analysis of the bill in the August issue of the OSBA Journal, available at http://links.ohioschoolboards.org/ August2021Journal.

OSSC Administrator **Emily Torok** shared the center's mission and purpose, which create a centralized team dedicated to improving school safety and consolidating resources and providing assistance to schools and first responders. The center also evaluates and improves resources for preventing, preparing for and responding to threats and acts of violence.

In addition to evaluating school emergency management plans and developing new training opportunities and resources, OSSC supports the Safer Ohio School Tip Line, a free anonymous reporting system available for school districts. Analysts collect and review calls and texts received through the tip line. If the analyst determines a threat or instance of self-harm exists, OSSC contacts local law enforcement, a school resource officer or the district to create an action plan, which includes resources and guidance

for the district. Torok said students have used the tip line to share information when peers have posted messages on social media indicating self-harm or that they were in crisis. OSSC worked with the district and school resource officers to intervene, providing resources to assist the student in crisis.

Districts can register for the tip line at https://ohioschoolsafety center.ohio.gov and request materials to promote this service to their students and other resources. The tip line phone number is (844) 723-3764.

Torok encouraged the trustees and school district personnel to attend the virtual Ohio School Safety Summit, Oct. 6-8. This free event will focus on comprehensive school safety, including emergency management, physical security, mental health, school climate, critical incident response, threat assessment, cybersafety, suicide prevention and transportation. More information will be available this fall at https://ohioschoolsafety center.ohio.gov.

In other business: • Director of Communication Services Jeff Chambers and Director of Board and Management Services Cheryl W. Ryan provided an overview of plans for an in-person Capital Conference and Trade Show. Currently, they are working with local officials, the Greater Columbus Convention Center, area hotels and other conference partners to set health and safety protocols for the event. Chief Executive Officer Rick Lewis and Halkias gave a report on National School Boards Association (NSBA) activities and membership dues. The trustees approved a recommendation to review the OSBA's membership status with NSBA at the November OSBA Board of Trustees meeting.
OSBA Deputy Chief Executive Dr. Kathy McFarland led an update on the work being accomplished through OSBA's strategic plan, Visionary Initiatives for Strategic Action (VISA).

• Amy Kissinger, Cambridge City, described recent efforts to develop a stronger advocacy network in the Southeast Region.

• Heard provided an overview of the OSBA Executive Committee's discussion on the regional allotment of members to the OSBA Board of Trustees. The association's constitution states that "one representative each from the six(6)districts in the state of Ohio with the largest pupil enrollment" sits on the board. Historically, the six districts with the largest pupil enrollment have been Akron City, Cincinnati Public, Cleveland Municipal, Columbus City, South-Western City and Toledo City. Recently, Olentangy Local's (Delaware) enrollment surpassed that of Akron City, leading to Olentangy Local replacing Akron City on the Board of Trustees in 2022.

The next OSBA Board of Trustees meeting is Nov. 7 during the OSBA Capital Conference in Columbus.

#### Medina student organizes back-to-school giveaway

Kamron Ford, a senior at Medina City's Medina High School, knows what it's like to "stress out" over finding school supplies.

Fortunately, many of his peers don't have to worry this year after he single-handedly organized a back-to-school giveaway with more 300 book bags and other essentials for local students.


"I want this to be a yearly thing," Ford told a local newspaper. "COVID, in general, took away a lot of jobs and so much from people. I know how it feels to not have a new book bag or new clothes the first day of school. It was important for me to bring the community together like this. I haven't seen something like this in Medina before, and I wanted to make this the first, but not the last."

Ford spent roughly \$900 to purchase supplies, with most of the money coming out of his own pocket. Fundraising brought in more dollars for the effort, his mother, **Kimberly Ford**, said.

"I'm so proud of him. This is something he's wanted to do for a long time. ... Once all of the stuff came in, we had pretty much everything to give away: crayons, pencils, notebooks, folders, composition books, graphing notebooks, everything."

The event also offered free haircuts for students and food from local eateries.
