There's still time to register for the Capital Conference and Trade Show

Workshop dates and descriptions

Dec. 1 — Transportation rules and regulations

This course is essential for new transportation administrators and any school administrator involved with transportation services. The rules and regulations — revised and administrative codes — that govern student transportation will be reviewed. The local policy contains the standards to which you are held and can be a liability when your department fails to meet them. This course is an annual part of MTA and is different each year to focus on areas that are particularly sensitive in the current environment.

Feb. 2 — Federal regulations, guidance and agencies

School transportation is not only governed by local rules but also is subject to a significant number of federal rules and regulations. We will look at the external impacts on transportation and consider the federal alphabet soup: including FMCSA, NHTSA, NTSB, TSB and ODI. Part of this session will look at various federal studies that continue to be landmarks in the student transportation industry.

March 2 — Laws, rules and policy — what, how and why

What is the difference between revised code, administrative code and department policy? Are they all mandates that must be followed, or are they just best practice that should be followed? What happens when they conflict? We will look at the technical aspects of various regulatory controls and the process that is invoked in moving an idea for change into policy, rule or revised code. Is this "government 101"? Perhaps, but it is also important for you to understand in the event you want to help influence the future.

April 6 — Hot topics — safety, trends and statistics

This final session of the year will look at hot topics in the school transportation industry. As part of that review, we will look at the never-ending discussion on passenger restraints, review crash studies completed by the National Transportation Safety Board, look at Ohio school bus accident statistics and leave the door open for attendees to bring up topics that are important in their districts. While we explore these hot topics, an underlying focus is also on how to identify the learning points in each of these areas and to share them with the staff that delivers our front-line transportation services.

"I'm a North Coast girl, being raised in Sandusky, and spend as much time as I can at Lake Erie at our cottage," she said. "It's become a magnet for our children to come back and visit and relax."

Rothey succeeds Dr. Judy Jackson May, who had been the association's Northwest regional manager since 2002. Only the late Dr. Neil A. Pohlmann had served longer, from 1974-1996.

Pohlmann, who died in 2015, was a strong and respected advocate of public education and demonstrated significant impact on the lives of superintendents, principals, students and countless other educators in northwest Ohio.

The region's Neil Pohlmann Excellence in Education Award is given annually to a long-serving board member who has supported the work of the Northwest Region and helped to promote and support public education in Ohio.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

GOP proposes universal 'backpack' voucher bill

Two Ohio House Republicans recently unveiled a sweeping proposal to establish a universal, statewide voucher program, dubbed the Backpack Scholarship Program. Reps. Marilyn S. John (R-Richland County) and Riordan T. McClain (R-Upper Sandusky) announced the details of their plan in an Oct. 6 press conference, joined by students and religious education organizations.

The legislation, House Bill (HB) 290, was introduced on May 5 and referred to the House Finance Committee but has yet to receive a hearing. The current version of HB 290 contains only placeholder language expressing the General Assembly's intent to create a funding formula for all students that allows families to choose the

option for all computed funding amounts to follow students to the schools they attend and ensure strong funding for public and nonpublic schools while cultivating innovation and opportunity for all children. John and McClain explained that the Finance Committee would adopt a substitute version of their bill that includes the details announced during the press release.

Under the forthcoming version of the bill, beginning in the 2023-24 school year, all students enrolled in public chartered nonpublic or non-chartered nonpublic schools and all homeschooled students would be eligible for a state-paid voucher, referred to as an education savings account, or ESA. The voucher

amount for the 2023-24 school year would be \$5,500 for students in grades kindergarten through eight and \$7,500 for high school students. That amount would increase in future fiscal years by the same percentage that the statewide average base cost per pupil increases.

The voucher could be used only for the following purposes:

- tuition and fees at a participating chartered nonpublic school, nonchartered nonpublic school or nonpublic online learning program;
- tutoring or intervention services by an individual or educational facility, provided that the services are not provided by an immediate family member of the student;

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- fees for nationally standardized assessments, Advanced Placement examinations and any examinations related to college or university admission as well as tuition or fees for preparatory courses for those examinations;
- tuition and fees for programs of study or the curriculum of courses that lead to an industry-recognized credential that satisfies a workforce need:
- educational services, including occupational, behavioral, physical, speech-language and audiology therapies;
- curriculum, textbooks, instructional materials and supplies;
- fees for after-school and summer educational programs.

The program does not establish any income limits, so any student — regardless of family income — is eligible for the voucher, and the state treasurer is explicitly required to approve applications for a voucher from school-aged children. Students must annually

reapply for the voucher.

Effective July 1, 2023, the substitute bill would eliminate the report card-based Ohio **Educational Choice Scholarship** program (EdChoice), incomebased EdChoice Expansion program and Cleveland voucher program and establish the Backpack Scholarship Program in their place. It also would retain the Autism Scholarship Program and the Jon Peterson Special Needs Scholarship Program and qualify students receiving vouchers under those programs to also receive a voucher under the Backpack Scholarship Program.

Chartered nonpublic and nonchartered nonpublic schools that elect to participate in the Backpack Scholarship Program must annually notify the state treasurer and do the following:

• administer to K-8 students nationally recognized measures of achievement, as determined by each school, in reading, math and history at least every other year;

- administer to high school students the five end-of-course exams and require completion of the graduation seals process while still applying the existing exemptions from those requirements;
- report the aggregate results of those measures and assessments, which will be published and provided to parents upon their request.

Similar to current voucher program policies, participating nonpublic schools would be prohibited from charging students a tuition amount that is greater than \$5,500 for K-8 students or \$7,500 for high school students if their family income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty level.

The bill specifies several scenarios specifying how unspent backpack voucher funds will be handled. For example, one-half of a student's unspent funds in a given year will be carried over to the next year's ESA if that student

Carey EV students turn bottle caps into colorful artwork

Colorful works of art now decorate the playground at **Carey EV**'s Carey Elementary School after students turned thousands of plastic bottle caps into mosaics.

"I wanted something that was a little bit easier for the kids to do spatially and physically," Title I reading teacher **Mindy Worst** told a local newspaper. "And, I also wanted to show them what they could do with recycled products, other than throwing them in the landfill."

Carey is a Leader in Me school. As part of the student development program, teachers choose a topic that interests students who then sign up for a club that sparks their curiosity. Worst said there are separate clubs for kindergartners and first-graders and then groups for combined second-, third-, fourth-and fifth-graders who meet monthly from October through May.

Worst's Mosaic Art Club made

a picture out of glass tiles that depicts a tree during the four seasons, which now hangs in the school. Last year, she decided to try mosaics using recycled bottle caps. "There are so many different sizes (of bottle caps), I had no idea," she said.

The National FFA organization provided her with plywood for the base of the shapes. Everything but the paint and screws was donated.

reapplies for a voucher for the subsequent school year, in addition to that year's \$5,500 or \$7,500 payment. The remaining half will be transferred to the state's general revenue fund.

For voucher students who do not reapply for a voucher for the subsequent year and have funds remaining in their ESA, the total of the remaining funds will be transferred to the student's public school or, if the student does not reenroll in any school, to the student's resident school district. For voucher students who leave their nonpublic school in the middle of a school year and transfer to a public school, the

remaining ESA funds will be transferred to the public school in which the student enrolls.

For voucher students who are graduating, the bill authorizes parents to request one-half of the balance to be transferred to a sibling's account or use one-half of the balance to transfer to a 529 college savings plan. The remaining half will be transferred to the state's general revenue fund. If a parent does not submit a request for a graduating voucher student, the total balance will be transferred to the state's general revenue fund.

The program would be administered by the state treasurer's office, whose duties

would include establishing an application process; ensuring all family expenditures are in compliance with allowable uses; determining penalties for fraudulent activity by participating schools, providers, students or parents; and employing personnel and engaging with consultants, actuaries, auditors, counsel and others for assistance. The substitute bill appropriates \$5 million in fiscal year 2023 to support activities and costs incurred by the state treasurer to administer the program.
