Study offers districts recommendations on cybersecurity

While K-12 leaders are much more aware of cyberattack risks than in previous years, the awareness has not lead to stronger security procedures. With cyberattacks increasing, few leaders have audited their district's cybersecurity. A lack of collaboration may be hampering districts' ability to find the right balance among digital resource access, security issues and user behavior, which leaves many districts vulnerable to cybersecurity problems, according to a study from Iboss and Project Tomorrow.

Of those surveyed in the study, 30% responded that their school district suffered a cyberattack in 2022. To prepare for a cyberattack, the district must audit its cybersecurity health — the study showed that only half of the district technology leaders had conducted such an audit. Best practice dictates that school districts adopt a district policy requiring a security audit be conducted annually.

The findings of the study urge district leaders to consider a new cybersecurity ecosystem rooted in best practices, threat assessment, training and accountability. Moreover, the effort to protect student data and other sensitive digital assets must be shared by staff outside the Instructional Technology (IT) Departments. Two-thirds of the survey respondents claimed that cybersecurity was the sole responsibility of the IT staff. As districts balance access to digital resources, user behaviors and security issues, staff at every level will need to share responsibility for digital security.

The study results suggested the following three action steps to develop more comprehensive cybersecurity strategies:

- provide continued cybersecurity education and training, including regular updates and information sessions to build a new culture of shared accountability and responsibility;
- conduct a risk assessment to fully alert staff to cyber threats facing K-12;
- implement small procedural changes as a pathway to a larger more systemic approach to cybersecurity.
